The collections of World Cultures and Mediterranean Archaeology, comprising 9,640 objects, are unequalled in Quebec and among the largest in Canada. Many of these pieces are the result of judicious acquisitions made by F. Cleveland Morgan, volunteer curator of the Museum from 1916 to 1962.



Early to Modern International Art

In its size, variety and quality, the MMFA's international art collection is unique in Quebec and one of the three largest in Canada. Its presentation in the Michal and Renata Hornstein Pavilion for Peace, inaugurated in 2016, enables the Museum to display the strength and depth of one of Canada's outstanding collections, which covers important milestones of civilization. The works of the Hornstein gift have been incorporated into the existing collection both chronologically and thematically. Thus, 750 works of international art are displayed on four levels of the building, while Ben Weider's Napoleonic collection is also integrated into the layout of the pavilion in a fluid and logical manner.



International Contemporary Art

Contemporary art figures prominently in the MMFA's galleries and acquisition programme. The Museum's galleries showcase works created since 1980 by local, Canadian and international artists: abstract and figurative paintings, multimedia projects, minimalist and monumental sculptures are a testament to contemporary preoccupations. The Sculpture Garden laid out around the Museum complex, constitutes a major collection of the most prominent names in contemporary sculpture: David Altmejd, Jim Dine, Antony Gormley, Henry Moore and Jean-Paul Riopelle. The Contemporary Art Square, with its exhibition programme open to all current practices – from the fine arts and video to design and fashion – is emblematic of the vitality of today's creativity. The temporary exhibitions in this space are aimed at promoting artists from here and elsewhere, serving as a platform for meetings and exchanges on contemporary creativity.

Decorative Arts and Design

The MMFA possesses one of the most important collections of decorative arts and design prior to 1900 in North America. Renowned for its scope, comprises 4,150 objects, including silverware, glass, ceramics, metal, textiles, enamels and furniture. The richness of the materials and the range of styles testify to the quality of the collection and illustrate the evolution of the decorative arts between 1400 and 1900.

In addition, the collection of decorative arts and design after 1900, unique in Canada, contains over 6,100 objects – furniture, jewellery, ceramics, glass, silverware and textiles – executed by international designers. The collection retraces the major movements that have marked the history of decorative arts and design since 1900, especially Art Nouveau, Art Deco, modernism and post-modernism.




Photography and Graphic Arts

The Montreal Museum of Fine Arts is the repository of one of the most important graphic arts collections in Canada, encompassing prints, drawings and photographs that survey over five centuries of graphic achievement and include masterpieces by a broad diversity of artists spanning the history of European and North American art.

Contemporary works constitute the main part of the Museum's photographic collection, which comprises over 2,500 photos from Canada, the United States, Europe, Africa and Asia. In recent years, the Museum's collection has been considerable enlarged by numerous documentary works executed by Quebec photographers.

As the Museum had focussed on acquiring works that documented the majorstages of the medium's development, the photographic collection will soon benefit by additional exhibition space.


